Understanding Crisis Management in a Care Home Environment

A

Term: Acute Incident

Related Terms: Emergency, Critical Event

Explanation: An unexpected, high-intensity situation that threatens the safety of residents, staff, or property and requires immediate response. Example: A resident suddenly becomes unresponsive due to a cardiac arrest. Practical Application: Activate the emergency response plan, call emergency services, and initiate CPR according to training. B

C

Term: Backup Plan
