Consulting Skills For Healthcare Professionals

Accountability

Related terms: Responsibility, Transparency

Explanation: The duty of a healthcare consultant to own decisions, actions, and results, ensuring they align with client goals and ethical standards.

Example: When a consultant advises on a new electronic health record (EHR) workflow, they must monitor adoption rates and report outcomes.
